Membership of the Parish Council.

The parish council was delighted to co-opt Karl Kay and Kevin Main to the parish council at the meeting on 5 November 2024. David Bellamy was elected as a councillor in an uncontested election. We are grateful to Karl, Kevin and Dave for agreeing to be councillors. There are now two further vacancies on the parish council. We will display a notice on the noticeboard regarding these vacancies.

Flood Risk Management; the Parish council is addressing flood risk as a priority.

The Parish Council is working to reduce future flood risk and has paid to get the culvert cleared. It has been noted during these works that properties adjoining the culvert have put their grass cuttings on the culvert side of their fence which are in danger of falling into the drainage culvert. This could cause flooding issues and will increase parish council expenditure in clearing the culvert. Please could residents backing onto the culvert dispose of their grass cuttings in the appropriate waste bins. We are also aware of children playing in the culvert. Please could you ensure this does not happen.

The Parish council has reported the issue of the blocked drain from Meadowcroft to School lane on FIXMYSTREET. We would urge parishioners to report these issues on FIXMYSTREET as they occur. The more reports highways receive the more the more likely they will be to take action.

The Parish council is also looking into the possibility of clearing the ditch adjacent to Enfield Road.

Speeding; your parish needs you!!!. Further volunteers are needed.

At the request of parishioners the Parish Council has purchased a speed gun. We need more volunteers to run the programme. Full training will be given. If you are willing to join the speed gun team please contact Dave Bellamy (01507 343862) or a Councillor.

New village signs

The parish council are looking into the costs of erecting two new village signs. We ran a competition with Donington on Bain Primary School who have designed the concept for the sign. Our initial investigations indicated a cost of between £1,200 and £1,500 per sign. We will need two signs. We are investigating more cost efficient options with local companies.

Parish Council Meeting

The latest meeting of the Parish Council took place at All Saints, Goulceby on Monday 2nd December at which two parish residents and the elected district councillor were also in attendance. The business that required conducting was quite short so there is little to report from the Council itself, the main item being the precept for the next year (2025/26). The draft minutes will be placed on the two village noticeboards and also on the Council website. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Wednesday 12th March 2025 at 7:00pm

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Precept

The Council levies a charge on all households each year to fund its activities. The majority of the Council's spending (77%) goes on clerking, insurance and audit costs. The remainder is spent on maintaining two village planters, subscriptions, room hire, bank charges and miscellaneous administration costs. In the previous newsletter, comments were invited from residents around any specific projects which they thought could be supported by the Council. By the time of the last meeting, no comments had been received.

In setting the precept for 2025/26 the Council considered likely increases in clerking salary costs (inflation), newly introduced bank charges, increased audit costs and increased insurance costs. A decision was made to levy a total precept of £4,078 for next year which is paid across 126 households. This charge means a slight increase of 46 pence per household per month. Asterby and Goulceby's precept is the 26th lowest out of 102 Parish Councils in East Lindsey.

Speeding in the village

One matter considered by the Council was that of speeding in the village of Goulceby, particularly down Horncastle Road on the approach to the village where the limit reduces from 60mph to 30mph. This had been raised by a village resident and a suggestion had been made around considering installing a speed indicator display on the road. The Council noted that there have been no reported incidents due to speeding and the cost of any installation could be prohibitive. However, it was agreed to keep the situation under consideration and the Council would be grateful to hear views of residents on the matter. Winter preparation / Frequently Asked Questions Is my area at risk of flooding?

Find out if your area is at risk of flooding, the current alerts and warnings that have been issued and sign up for free flood warnings here www.gov.uk/check-flooding or call the Floodline service on 0345 988 1188. Sign up for flood warnings here: www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-floodwarnings. An explanation about what flood warnings are and what to do is available here www.gov.uk/quidance/flood-alerts-and-warnings-what-they-are-and-what-to-do You mav find this document helpful on surface water floodina https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/flood-risk-maps-for-surface-water-how-touse-the-map but if you do have concerns regarding surface water flooding, this will be addressed by the local authority.

What more can I do to protect my property? If you think you are about to be flooded (i.e. flood warning or severe flood warning issued) then please: Turn off your gas, electricity and water supplies, if it is safe to do so—do not touch an electrical switch if you're standing in water. Move your family, vehicles, pets and important items to safety e.g. upstairs or higher ground. Use flood products if you have them e.g. flood barriers or air brick covers. Follow advice from the emergency services or local council—you may be asked to evacuate. For information on Flood Products to help reduce the impact of flooding on your home e.g. flood doors, airbrick covers, visit www.bluepages.org.uk Alternatives include putting soil in bags to go across doorways, and down the toilet/sink. You could prepare an Emergency Bag of essential items. This might include spare glasses, waterproof coat, medication and a copy of any recent prescription, water, food, insurance documents and pet food. You could consider hand sanitiser and a face covering too.

Do shop around to find the right insurance policy for you. Why not see if Flood Re can help – www.floodre.co.uk? This is a joint initiative between Government and insurers aiming to make the flood cover part of household insurance policies more affordable. The history of Santa Claus is a fascinating blend of folklore, religious traditions, and cultural evolution.

his roots back to Saint Nicholas, a 4th-century Greek Christian bishop from Myra (modern-day Turkey). Known for his piety and generosity, Saint Nicholas was famous for secretly giving gifts to those in need1. One popular legend tells of him providing dowries for three poor sisters, saving them from a life of hardship. Evolution of the Legend Over the centuries, Saint Nicholas's story spread across Europe. In the Netherlands, he became known as Sinterklaas, and Dutch settlers brought this tradition to America in the 17th and 18th centuries. The name "Santa Claus" evolved from the Dutch "Sinter Klaas".

Here's a brief overview; origins with Saint Nicholas Santa Claus traces

Clement Clarke Moore and Thomas Nast In 1822, Clement Clarke Moore penned the poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas" (more commonly known as "Twas the Night Before Christmas", which helped shape the modern image of Santa Claus. Later, in the 19th century, Thomas Nast illustrated Santa as a jolly, rotund man with a white beard, wearing a red suit. Modern Depictions The popular image of Santa Claus as a portly, bearded man in a red suit was further solidified by Haddon Sundblom's illustrations for Coca-Cola advertisements in the 1930s. Today, Santa is a beloved figure associated with Christmas, known for delivering gifts to children around the world on Christmas Eve. Cultural Impact Santa Claus has become a symbol of generosity, joy, and the spirit of giving. His story continues to be celebrated in various cultures, with traditions like leaving out cookies and milk for him on Christmas Eve.
