Minutes of Annual Public Meeting, Held at the Heaneage Arms on Thursday, 16th May 2024

Present: Cllrs. Stewart (chair), Olivant, Raynor, Dyas, Chetwynd – Talbot.

Clerk – D Bailey

Apologies: Cllr South

11 members of the public from Benniworth Parish

- 1. The chair introduced the new clerk, and who gave a brief outline of his previous experience. The new clerk, David Bailey, joined the Council on 16th May 2024. David was the clerk to Owston Ferry Parish Council some years ago, so comes to us with a great deal of previous experience.
- 2. The chair then referred to the recent questionnaire sent out to all members of the Parish. A return of 67% was recorded, which was based on 87 questionnaires distributed across the Parish. Cllr Raynor having compiled the response, noted that a village community ranked very highly, and that many of the events itemised were regarded as enjoyable, albeit attendance at church was ranked quite low. There was a reasonable spread of preference for communication methods. Copies of the responses will be available on the website.
- 3. Specific items raised:
- a. Grass verge cutting. Concerns that grass verge cutting was not being carried out, the chair assured residents that Mr. Olivant was undertaking this.
- b. Bus timetable. The bus timetable is not easily available. Action clerk to put a copy in the website.
- c. Overhead power lines Concern over the lack of progress on removing the overhead power lines Action chair to contact James Cousins to request a report on progress and reasons for the delays

- d. Speeding: a lengthy and detailed discussion ensued with regard to the complexities of government legislation regarding the implementation of speed limits in rural up areas. The lack of a 30mph speed limit in Benniworth has been an ongoing issue for a considerable length of time. A number of residents put forward their views and concerns over the safety of people in the village. There are also ongoing concerns about the speed of vehicles travelling along Caistor High Street which should be taken into consideration in any investigations. Action- although no clear conclusions could be reached as a result of the meeting, the Parish Council agreed to investigate the matter further with the relevant authorities.
- e. Activities One of the main concerns over the implementation of an activity programme is the lack of a suitable venue. Although St. Julians church has been used in the past, its future is in doubt due to the lack of worshippers, and the physical state of the building. Cllr. South submitted, in her absence, a report on the situation outlining the issues surrounding the future of the church. Potentially it could be used for the next three years, after which its physical condition may have deteriorated. The chair asked if residents wanted a Christmas Carol service in the church, and this was roundly supported

A number of Residents stated that the land behind Tennyson Avenue had been used in the past, and that the Heneage Arms is available for both inside and outside events.

It was further noted that South Willingham and East Barkwith with also have facilities that could be used, and so it would make sense to use existing facilities rather than seeking funding for a new facility in Benniworth that would require both capital and revenue funding. It was agreed that some form of village committee would be required, and various ways of starting it up were discussed.

Action – that Cllr. Chetwynd-Talbot to consult and compile a second survey be questionnaire, and two events be agreed and volunteers sought. Action – Cllr. Raynor to distribute the questionnaire.

The chair asked if the parishioner who looks after Neighbourhood Watch needed any help, but it was stated that this organisation no longer exists, and that additional help was not required. The chair thanked everyone for attending, and for their valuable contributions. The meeting closed at 20.20



Lincolnshire Wolds AONB, now a National Landscape



AONBs have been rebranded as National Landscapes which includes the Lincolnshire Wolds

In 2019, an extensive review of Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs) and National Parks in England was published by Julian Glover. The review included the recommendation that AONBs were rebranded as National Landscapes to strengthen them with new 'purposes, powers and resources'.



In 2022, the government responded to the Glover Landscapes Review and agreed

that the national significance of AONBs should be 'reflected in their name'. As such, work has been undertaken with the National Association for AONBs which, going forward, shall be known as 'National Landscapes'. The rebranding was launched on the 22 November 2023.

Rebrand reasoning

The rebranding of the AONBs in England as National Landscapes shall strengthen their purpose, bringing them in line with National Parks. The shift should also enable additional funding sources and an increase in the profile of AONBs nationally.

AONBs will not become planning bodies as National Parks are, but it is likely that we could see the introduction of additional powers. This will enable the AONBs to provide comments that carry a further weight in the assessment of planning applications than existing. It could ultimately lead to further difficulty for those wishing to undertake development within these designated areas, bringing constraints in line with those already experienced by members living within National Parks.

Annual Parish Meeting

The annual parish meeting took place at the Three Horseshoes on Tuesday 28th May at which four parish residents and the elected district councillor were in attendance. The Chairman of the Parish Council (Jon Mold) welcomed all to the meeting and thanked the other two parish councillors (Ian Taylor and Graham Johnson) for their work on the council over the last 12 months. He also thanked Diane De Halle for her work as clerk and responsible finance officer over the last 12 months.

A short report was read out to the meeting highlighting the work of the parish council over the last year. Particular reference was made to the new notice board in Goulceby which had been funded by an ELDC community grant. Mention was also made of the three current vacancies on the parish council noting that with only three current parish councillors the council was only just quorate and the quest would continue to find more people to volunteer to serve as parish councillors.

The efforts of the church restoration fund raisers were also acknowledged at the meeting.

One member of the parish asked for feedback on experiences of other parish members around Quickline, the fast broadband provider in the village. One member of the council advised that their Quickline installation had been operational for over six months now with no issues at all and the claimed speeds were being achieved and maintained. Another member confirmed that their installation was fully up and running without any ongoing issues. However, the initial installation had not gone quite as smoothly as they would have liked due to issues with a nearby pole not being resolved as quickly as they should have which required several visits to resolve. Overall though, it was confirmed that the general feedback from residents who had switched had found it to have been worthwhile and without issues.

Thanks were recorded for the use of the Three Horseshoes and All Saints for the council's meetings during the year.

Annual meeting of the Parish Council

The annual meeting of the parish council also took place on 28 th May with most of the time being taken up by the annual year-end formalities around governance and finance. The conclusion of the Auditor who reviewed all aspects of governance and finance was that "the council is well governed".

Each year the authority prepares an Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR). The AGAR has been published by the council. Any person interested has the right to inspect and make copies of the AGAR, the accounting records for the financial year to which it relates and all books, deeds, contracts, bills, vouchers, receipts and other documents relating to those records must be made available for inspection by any person interested. For the year ended 31 March 2024, these documents will be available on reasonable notice by application to: Mrs Diane De Halle Parish Clerk & RFO agparishcouncil@gmail.com .

New Environment Crime enforcement officers to tackle on-street litter and dog fouling.

New Environment Crime enforcement officers to tackle on-street litter and dog fouling in East Lindsey.

Environmental Crime enforcement officers will soon be taking to the streets in East Lindsey. The team will be walking around the district's tourist centres, towns and villages in a bid to enforce and educate people on such things as deliberately dropping litter and those who fail to pick up after their dog or fail to be able to provide the means to pick up after their dog. The officers will begin patrolling areas of East Lindsey later this month and will be issuing £150 fixed penalty notices to those who are caught breaking the rules. Anyone who does not discharge their liability by paying the fine will face prosecution in court. As well as dog fouling and litter, the team have also been given the powers to deal with other environmental crime such as fly-tipping and

graffiti. Some of their work will be carried out using information passed to us by members of the public and local councillors. It is hoped that the environmental crime enforcement officers will deter irresponsible behaviour and encourage people to dispose of their rubbish more responsibly and keep East Lindsey at its best for residents and visitors.

Disposal of household waste

The guidance below was received from the Association of Local Councils and we thought it might be useful to share it.

Your household waste must be disposed of correctly. If you're giving it to someone else, you must make sure that they're legally allowed to take it. You could be fined if you give your household waste to someone who is not legally allowed to take it. What counts as household waste is any waste that comes from your household. It can include:

your usual household rubbish unwanted or unusable items such as old mattresses, furniture or electrical items, garden waste, oils and paints, scrap metal such as old car parts, septic tank sludge

DIY waste such as rubble, timber or bricks.

What to do with household waste

Most of your usual household rubbish can go in the bins provided by your local council. For rubbish that you cannot put in the bins, you can:

arrange a special collection for large waste items (for example, an old mattress or fridge) www.gov.uk/collection-large-waste-items. Dispose of garden waste through your local council www.gov.uk/garden-waste-disposal. take your waste to the household waste and recycling centre run by your local council, take your waste to a permitted private waste site, use a registered private business that provides a waste collection service for example, a skip company or household clearance service, and get a receipt.

give old electrical items to retailers when you buy new electrical items from them with the same function - for example, you can give a shop your old kettle when you buy a new one, give away or sell reusable items - for example, by giving items to a charity shop. If you use a private business that provides a waste collection service, you must check the company is on the register of waste carriers. If you give your waste to someone who cannot legally take it and you did not do the necessary checks on them, you might: have to pay a fixed penalty notice' to your local council

be prosecuted and have to pay a higher penalty - for example, if you do not pay your penalty notice on time or if you've previously had a penalty notice for a similar offence. This could happen, for example, if something that has been fly-tipped (dumped illegally) is identified as yours.
