Minutes of Meeting Held at St. Julians Church

on WEDNESDAY 26th JUNE 2024

Present: Cllrs. Stewart (chair), Olivant, Raynor, Chetwynd - Talbot

Clerk - D Bailey

1. Apologies for absence. Cllr. South, On furlough. Cllrs. Dyas, Mcallister

2. Attendance by members of the public

Two members of the public were welcomed to the meeting. One member of the public offered support to the Parish Council in whatever capacity would be most useful. The Chair thanked them for the offer.

The second member of the public offered the Rectory Garden as the venue for the forthcoming Village BBQ. This was discussed and is summarised below in point 7 – update on social events

3. To approve the minutes of the meeting held on the 21st February, 2024 (previously circulated).

Proposed that the minutes be accepted and signed.

Proposed - Cllr. Raynor Seconded - Cllr. Olivant

4. Finance Officers Report

Report accepted. Cllr Olivant noted that the grass cutting would be in the region of £800 - £1000 and is due to be paid. This was agreed.

5. Update on Homestead Farm development.

The clerk read out the emails from PWC, who are the building control surveyors. It is still not clear from the emails what plans, if any, have yet been submitted for the disposal of foul water and surface water. A local resident also has concerns about the dumping of soil and rubble which may impact upon drainage of rainwater.

Action clerk to discuss with ELDC to establish the current situation and the protocols for waste water disposal.

6. Update on second questionnaire

Cllr Chetwynd-Talbot stated that this was still in progress, and two volunteers were offering to help. Cllr Raynor offered to distribute the questionnaire when the time came, and the clerk suggested that his address be added to the locations where the questionnaire could be returned.

7. Update on social events

In the earlier public forum one member of the public offered the Rectory Garden as the venue for the forthcoming Village BBQ. After some discussion, the following was agreed: The date would be either Friday12th July commencing at 5p.m., or Friday 16 th August commencing at 5p.m., the BBQ being weather dependant.

The event would be funded by sale of tickets

Food would be purchased by the Parish Council and attendees be expected to bring their own drinks, and any specific dietary requirements.

Cllr. Chetwynd-Talbot will prepare the tickets and advertise on Facebook and WhatsApp. Cllr. Olivant will provide salads.

Various offers were made to provide cakes.

The chair thanked the Member of Public for his kind offer

The Cheese and Wine event will be decided upon after the BBQ, given that two dates have been set aside in case of inclement weather.

8. Clerk noted that the laptop was now up and running. He also produced a suggested agenda of the future based upon the Good Practice Agenda produced by LALC. This was circulated and will be emailed to the Councillors not in attendance.

Noted that the future meeting dates will be: - 25th September. 29th January 2025, 23rd April 2025, 21st May 2025 – AGM and Public Meeting.

The meeting closed at 20.05.

WWJD?

WWJD? Have you seen this acronym before? It means 'What Would Jesus Do?' "WWJD?" is a question I often ask myself. When I'm uncertain, when I feel conflicted, when I am challenged by others, when I feel a path forward is blocked. I've spoken to people who are not Christians but who know about Christianity, and they think Jesus was a pretty cool guy regardless of religion, whose ideas on how we treat each other are as applicable today as they were over 2000 years ago. Love, peace, kindness, gentleness, patience, self-control. You don't have to be religious to want these things for the world. These characteristics, amongst others, demonstrated by Jesus again and again, are called out in the Bible with the

affirmation "Against such things, there is no law" (Galatians 5:22). With "the law" being summed up in one phrase, one command: "Love your neighbour as yourself". Wouldn't the world be a better place if there was more of this? Sometimes I find it hard to join the dots between what is written in the Bible and what I find in the modern world. But I keep trying, and I also try to find others who

have made the connection and have already understood the relevance to life today and can share it with me. I showed a draft of this article to a friend, and she said "It's not always easy, is it, to know what he would have done? He knew this, I believe, which is why he sent the Holy Spirit to guide us when he was no longer with us in person to do so. Prayer, Holy Spirit & Jesus' example keep me going! And LOVE!" Wise words indeed! So, faced with a challenge, I ask myself "WWJD?", and, viewed through that lens, a conclusion often becomes clear. The next time you have a conundrum, you could ask yourself — "WWJD?"

St. Martin's Church, Scamblesby


We continue to hold monthly services at St. Martin's, on the fourth Sunday of the month. In addition we hold celebration services, Harvest and Carol services for example, in season.





Lincolnshire Country Food ...





Green Tomato Chutney
4 lbs (1.8 kg) green tomatoes
2 lbs (900 g) apples
2 lbs (900 g) onions
8 oz (225 g) raisins
1 lb (450 g) sugar
1 quart (1150 ml) vinegar
1 tsp cayenne
2 oz (50 g) pickling spice
Skin the tomatoes and thinly slice them.
Peel and slice the apples and onions. Tie
the spices in a muslin bag. Put all the
ingredients in a large pan and cook gently,
stirring often, for 3-4 hours. When cool
remove the spices and pour into sterilised

jars and seal.

During my recent visits to the Donington on Bain Coffee, Cake and Chat mornings, (first Thursday of the month, Village Hall at 10.30am if you're interested), we've sometimes found ourselves talking about food.

One of my hobbies since the late 1960s, is a bit of cooking; never happier, in a kitchen.

My grandmother taught me how to cook. She was Lincolnshire through and through, who pronounced Louth rather oddly and referred to my uncle the pig farmer as "living out there in the country".

At first she taught me to make tiny bread loaves for my Action Man. Then came the real deal, potatoes swimming in lard, pies, tripe, haslet, chine, you know, all the good stuff.

My grandfather took control of game, we dressed the pheasant in the garage. I once recall a garage floor covered in berries, the pheasants last meal.

Here I am at least 5 years older now than she was back then, with a modest collection of cook books. still trying and still learning.

I've the usual predictable publications of an old man who spent his formative years in the 1970s and 1980s; some Delia, Keith Floyd, Madhur Jaffrey and the like. However one thing I always look out for is those books which are 'from where I'm from': Local, seasonal and the like. My favourite by a long way is this one. 'Lincolnshire Country Food', by Eileen Elder, published in 1985 by the Scunthorpe Museum and printed by the Scunthorpe Council Printing Department.

By some twist of fate, towards the end of my career, I inherited some of the people from that very printing department and I asked them if they had stored any of the plates or artwork from this publication. Unfortunately I was told that it would have all been destroyed in 1996. So with permission I had a copy made from the remaining copy I had found in the library.

As it's the season, and it's Lincolnshire, I've shared with you a recipe for green tomato chutney. I'll certainly be giving this a go. Preserved marrow features below it too and the courgettes on offer at the community stall certainly deserve this level of attention. Enjoy!
